Weekly Phonic Tasks

Following the same format of teaching as outlined in the previous learning packs **segment, blend and write** these words (I recommend 2 a day for 4 days). If you haven't finished working through the words from the previous pack, please ensure you finish those before moving on.

This week we aren't introducing any new sounds. Instead, the words will have the structure **CVCC** (consonant, vowel, consonant, consonant)

If the children are struggling please go back to the previous packs words and continue to practise or focus on 1 word per day. Please do not worry if they find these words tricky.

wept film gift

limp list

On the fifth day play **Silly Sound Swap** (the children know this game). If you have a whiteboard use that or use post it notes/small pieces of paper and put a sound on each piece.

Sounds you will need: b, e, f, s, y, i, m, ss

miss→mess→met→yet→let→less→loss→boss→box→fox→fix→mix→six

Weekly Reading Tasks

Read these high frequency words each day:

is, a, the, I, for, of, are, was, all, come, some, to

Continue to practise these words daily using flashcards or the activities outlined in the previous packs.

Ask your child to read these sentences:

The wind left dust on the mat.

The ant will come in and sink in the soft dust.

Speed Read

Ask your child to read these words as quickly as possible. Aim to have all words read in 1 minute. Track their score each day and challenge them to keep improving it!

Sill, yes, vex, mill, tell, mix, huff, less, tiff, sax, pill, yet, hill, yap, fox, boss, fell, puff, will, jazz.

Weekly Writing Tasks



Jack and the Beanstalk

Alternatively, I have re-wrote a simple version if you would prefer to use that.

Once upon a time there was a boy called Jack who sold his cow for some beans. Jack's mum was cross and she threw them out of the window. Early one morning he woke up and saw a huge beanstalk in the garden. So, he decided to climb it.

First, Jack saw a castle in the clouds.

Suddenly, Jack heard a Giant- Fee Fi Fo Fum little children in my tum!

Next, Jack found some golden eggs and a magic harp. The harp started playing and the Giant chased Jack- Fee Fi Fo Fum little children in my tum!

Finally, Jack ran back down the beanstalk, chopped the beanstalk and the Giant fell.

Jack and his mum lived happily ever after. The end.

Read/listen/watch the story then ask your child if they could retell it. They could make up some actions to help them.

Ask your child to draw a story map of the story. A story map is a picture for each part of the story (no writing) and the children use it to help retell the story.

They could even make puppets of each character and put on a Puppet show.

Fold a piece of paper into a booklet. Ask your child to design a front cover for the story writing the name of the author (their name) and a picture. On the following three pages ask your child to write the story splitting it into the beginning, middle and end. They could draw a picture for each part.

Weekly Maths Tasks

Money

This week we are going to be looking more closely at money (sorry Mums and Dads I know nearly everywhere is card only and I hardly have any change myself!)

- Money tree- Draw a template of a tree (trunk and branches), using a range of coins carefully place them under the paper and use coloured pencils or wax crayons to create rubbings. How much money is on your tree? You could create different trees worth different amounts. You could even use 1p's and 2p's then add how many altogether or create number sentences from this.
- Sorting- give your child a range of coins. Ask them to sort the coins. They could sort them based on size, shape, colour- they can choose. Discuss similarities and differences, EG isn't it funny how a 5p is smaller than a 2p. Why do they think that is?
- Out and about- If you feel comfortable, take your child shopping. Notice the different prices on items, read them to your child and compare how some are more expensive than others. Look at the receipt. Discuss what a receipt is and how it adds up all the different amounts- explain this is why we need to practise adding. Otherwise, Early Vision on Youtube have lots of videos of real life shopping for children.

- Pretend shop- Using household items/toys create a shop. Ask your child to give each item a price and discuss how we write 'p' after the amount. Encourage them to do this. Be a customer at the shop and role play scanning the items and adding up the different amounts. They could even create their own receipt.

Jack and the Beanstalk

- **Planting-** Plant a broad bean in a cup with damp cotton wool. Do not over water it, but check the cotton wool remains damp. You will be surprised how fast it can grow. Draw a picture of a castle and stick it onto a lolly stick or a stick from the garden. The broad bean shoot will grow up the stick and look like there is a castle on the top!
- **Life cycle-** Create a life cycle of a bean, drawing a picture to show each change and writing a sentence to explain what is happening. Or create a 'Bean Diary' where everyday you draw a picture and write about the changes.
- **Collage Beanstalk-** Using bits of newspaper/tissue paper create a collage of a beanstalk. Then print your child's hand on the top to create a castle. You could even tear cotton wool up to create clouds.
- **Seeds-** Look at a range of different seeds for different plants. Compare how they are similar and different. Create a repeat pattern with the seeds. EG big seed, small seed, big seed, small seed.
- **Cloud painting-** The castle where the giant lived was right up into the clouds. Shaving foam reminds me of clouds and is really fun to use. Swirl paint or food colouring into it then lay a piece of paper over the top. Leave for a few seconds then reveal your super cool painting!
- **Baked beans-** Serve your family up a tasty meal of baked beans! You could have them on toast or a jacket potato. You could even have them with fish fingers. Think about how you could make your meal healthier. Would baked beans and chips be healthy? Could you add some different vegetables to the baked beans? Write a recipe for your meal.
- **Castles-** There are lots of different castles in the North of England. Can you find them on Google maps?
- **Design a castle-** Design your own castle. It can be any colour you want! It could have a special flag or maybe your favourite TV character lives there or your favourite animal. Draw/build and label the different parts.
- **Magic bean-** If you had a magic bean what would it do? Decorate a pebble and pretend it is a magic bean. You could use stickers, glitter or paint. Write a card for someone special and give them your magic bean. Maybe it will give them an endless supply of chocolate or a dinosaur as their best friend. You choose!
